Filing Time Approaches for April 1 Consolidated Election

Petition packets for the April Consolidated Election for the election of municipal officials are available at the Village of Vernon Hills Clerk's Office, 290 Evergreen Drive, in compliance with the election law.

The Village of Vernon Hills will have the offices of three Trustee positions, all for four-year terms, on the ballot.

An individual wishing to file a petition to appear on the ballot must submit nominating petitions containing signatures of qualified voters equaling not less than 5% (126) of the voters at the April 3, 2001 Consolidated Election, and not more than 8% (201) signatures.

Completed nominating forms must be filed with the Village Clerk's Office

between 8:30 a.m. Monday, January 13 and 5 p.m. Tuesday, January 21, 2003.

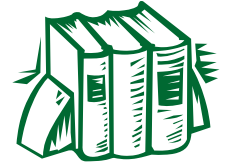
The election date has been scheduled for Tuesday, April 1, 2003. For further information, please contact the Village Clerk's Office at 847-367-3700.

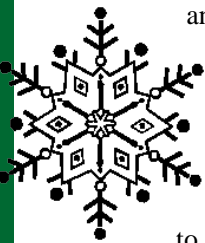

The Scoop on Snow Strategies

Snow can make for a beautiful Carrier and Ives lithograph. However on streets and sidewalks it is usually an inconvenience at best, and a hazard at worst. Vernon Hills works hard to keep those hazards and inconveniences to a minimum by salting and plowing to clear streets as quickly as possible. Here are some of the most often asked questions about Vernon Hills' snow and ice control procedures.



When Are Streets Plowed?

The Public Works Department begins an all-out plowing effort whenever two inches of snow has accumulated and snow is still falling. It is the Village's goal to clear all streets within eight hours after snowfall has ceased, however heavier snows take longer to clear. During a heavy snowfall, snow fighters concentrate on keeping main arterials clear for traffic and emergency vehicles.

Why Do We Use Salt?

The Public Works Department uses rock salt (sodium chloride) as the initial response for winter precipitation. This is the most efficient, cost effective method of snow and ice control for smaller amounts of precipitation. Application begins when precipitation starts to accumulate and cause unsafe travel conditions. Rock salt is pre-wetted with a solution to accelerate the melting action. Rock salt brine solution

is used for temperatures above 25°F. Liquid calcium chloride is the pre-wetting agent used at colder temperatures.

How Much Salt is Used?

The amount of salt used is determined on the basis of total accumulation, temperature, and traffic conditions. (Traffic aids the melting action and helps minimize the amount of salt used.) The Village uses about 1,400 tons of granular rock salt and 4,500 gallons of liquid calcium chloride each year. To salt Village streets takes two to four hours.

Are All Streets Salted?

Typically all main thoroughfares and through streets receive salt. Because of the minimal amount of traffic, salt is usually not applied on cul-de-sacs, though it will be used there as well if forecasts call for rapidly dropping temperatures or an ice storm.

What If I Have an Emergency?

If you experience a life-threatening emergency during a winter storm, call 911. The 911 operator will inform snow fighters if emergency plowing is needed to clear a path ahead of an ambulance, fire truck or police vehicle.

Who Clears Other Roads?

There are a few streets in the Village for which the Public Works Department is not responsible. State roads such as Routes 21, 45, 60 and 83 are cleared by the Illinois Department of Transportation. County crews plow Butterfield Road.

Why Are Cul-de-sacs Last?

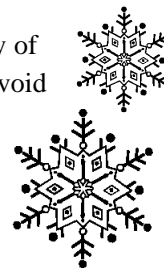
Actually, they aren't! Cul-de-sacs are the most time consuming streets to plow. On average, it takes 35 minutes to clear a cul-de-sac of snow, which is eight times longer per square yard of pavement than it takes to plow a through street. Cul-de-sacs are also more difficult to clear because of the limited space to place snow without burying driveways, mailboxes, streetlights or hydrants. There are 110 cul-de-sacs in the Village.

Who Clears Other Property?

The Village is responsible for clearing snow from all municipal parking lots and the Metra train station. Commercial properties are the responsibility of their owners.

Who Clears Driveways?

Driveways are the responsibility of residents. Village crews try to avoid putting large piles of snow in front of driveways; however, Village snowplows have to push the snow out of the road to allow safe travel. Please be a good neighbor and use your shovel or snow blower to put the snow onto your yard, not the street; putting snow onto the street causes dangerously slippery conditions for both motorists and pedestrians. If possible, wait until the plow has made the final pass on your street before clearing your driveway. To make your shoveling easier, clear your driveway to the right side as you face the street, moving in the direction of the plows.



Who Clears Sidewalks?

Residents and property owners take this responsibility. State law protects property owners from added liability if they shovel their sidewalks. You are also asked to clear snow around fire hydrants and meters to aid firefighters and meter readers. Village crews will clear some sidewalks around schools. After street operations are complete, sidewalk snow removal will begin during regular hours.

Turn In Firearms on December 7

For the second straight year, the Lake County Association of Chiefs of Police is sponsoring a gun buy back program. The program is a great opportunity to safely rid your home of old or unwanted firearms. This year it will be even easier for Vernon Hills residents to participate as the Vernon Hills Police Station will serve as a drop off point.

On Saturday, December 7 between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m., residents are urged to bring unwanted weapons, ammunition

and accessories to the Vernon Hills Police Department, 754 Lakeview Parkway. In return, the resident will receive a \$50 gift certificate to a local food or department store and a stuffed animal. All types of firearms and accessories will be accepted, and will then be destroyed. Pellet and BB guns can also be turned in, with participants receiving a toy, but no certificate.

Firearms must be unloaded and transported in the trunk of the car or in an

inaccessible area of a van or truck. If you wish to turn in a firearm but are uncomfortable handling the weapon or have no transportation, call the police department (847-362-4449) for assistance. If you have questions beforehand, call 847-247-4888.

Holiday Shopping Time...

Team Up for Holiday Safety

Another holiday season is upon us. Is your calendar already marred with notations? If not, it probably will be soon. This is also a busy time for the police department. As you might expect, there will be more traffic accidents and more shoplifting arrests. In fact, the increased activity affects the entire department — from the telecommunicators who answer the phone to the Community Service Officers who help find vehicles lost in the mall parking lot.

Tips for Safe Shopping

An ounce of prevention can be worth much more than a pound of cure. While members of the department will be out in force, we urge you to follow a few simple suggestions that will help keep you in the holiday spirit when you're out and about:

- Park in well-lit areas.
- Always lock your car, even if you'll "only be a minute."
- Hide valuables or put them in the trunk. A shopping bag on the car seat is an invitation to a thief.
- Avoid carrying large amounts of cash.
- Be alert to what's going on around you.
- Do not overburden yourself with packages. It makes it harder for you to stay alert and to react in an emergency.

- If you carry a purse, keep it in front of you and close to your body. Not only can you see it, but you can also cover it with your arm.
- If you use a wallet, carry it in an inside coat pocket or side pants pocket, rather than the rear pocket, which is more easily "picked."
- If you and your child become separated while shopping, make sure that he/she knows to go to a store clerk and ask for help. Teach children to stay in the store, and to never go into the parking lot alone.

Keeping Your Home Secure

When you're going out — whether for the afternoon or on vacation — take a moment to make sure your home is secure. Check that doors and windows are locked, leave on a light or two, or consider installing a light timer. If you'll be gone for longer periods, make sure the snow gets shoveled, and deliveries (mail, newspapers, packages) are collected or put on hold.

If you'll be out of town, consider requesting a vacation house watch. It's quick, free, and packed with peace of mind. Simply call the department at 847-362-4449.

Sam's Club Supports PD

Outstanding Results for Tobacco Checks

The Vernon Hills Police Department is in the third year of a grant to conduct underage tobacco "checks" at Vernon Hills tobacco licensees. The latest round of visits were conducted in late October — and the results were excellent!

Under the watchful eye of a police officer, a Vernon Hills Explorer Scout attempted to make either an over-the-counter purchase or a vending machine purchase at each establishment. Out of the 21 checks, a refusal to make the sale was made at all 21 of them.

The program, which is funded through a grant from the Illinois Liquor Control Commission (ILCC), also involves the distribution of educational material to businesses. Two more rounds of checks will take place prior to May.

Seniors: Here Comes the Bus

Did you know that the Village of Vernon Hills offers free bus service to residents 55 years of age and older? The bus runs on a set schedule that alternates among retail and medical facilities. Service is door to door, with the bus picking up and dropping off right at each resident's home.

Call the Day Before

Residents needing a ride must call the Village Hall (847-367-3700) at least 24 hours before the day they need a ride. The Clerk's Office is open from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Weekly Bus Schedule

The bus makes **trips to the Senior Center** between 9:30 and 10 a.m. on Monday through Friday. Trips home from the Center are scheduled the same days from 2 to 2:30 p.m. In addition:

- **Monday — Medical Appointments:** Bus runs from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. Please make your appointments between 9:30 a.m. and 1 p.m. for facilities within Vernon Hills, Mundelein, Libertyville, as well as Lake Forest and Deerpath Medical Center in Lake Bluff.
- **Tuesday — Shopping and Library:** Stops include the Vernon Area Public Library as well as grocery stores, malls

(including Westfield Shoppingtown Hawthorn), banks, beauty salons, and other businesses within Vernon Hills.

- **Wednesday** — Trips to and from the Senior Center.
- **Thursday — Shopping and Library** (see Tuesday description).
- **Friday — Medical Appointments** (see Monday description).

Tips from the Building Division...

Window Condensation — A Seasonal Nuisance

Whether your home is old or new, interior window condensation during the winter often presents homeowners with a perplexing problem. Understanding why condensation occurs can assist in battling this seasonal nuisance.

Today's building technology has resulted in more energy efficient, "tighter" homes. This is great for keeping homes more comfortable, quiet, and clean. Unfortunately, tightly sealed homes keep moisture in and dry air out, thus creating high levels of humidity.

Everyday household activities such as cooking, bathing, laundering, and dish-washing contribute a significant amount of water vapor into the air. Plants, heating systems, and humidifiers also add to a home's humidity. Condensation will commonly occur on windows when indoor humidity levels are high and the glass temperature falls below the dew point of the air inside the home.

People often become flustered believing that "energy efficient" windows will

eliminate the condensation problem. While newer windows with improved insulation value and less air leakage will theoretically allow the inside glass temperature to remain warmer and less prone to condensation, the lack of air movement inside the home acts as a catalyst for increased levels of moisture. Reducing moisture, increasing air movement, and introducing outdoor air in the home are the only sure ways to battle window condensation.

7 Tips for Reducing Your Home's Humidity

- 1 All ventilation to the outside should be functional and used whenever possible. Use kitchen and bathroom exhaust fans frequently. Consider installing an exhaust fan in the laundry room.
- 2 "Air-out" the kitchen, bathroom, and laundry room after use with outside air, if possible. Outside air usually contains less water vapor and will "dilute" the humidity of inside air.

3 The process of heating your home will reduce the relative humidity, provided it's dry heat. Fireplaces and wood-burning stoves assist in removing moisture from the home.

4 If a furnace humidifier or other moisture adding device is used, be sure it is adjusted to produce the proper amount of humidity, or turn it off. An indoor humidity level of between 20% to 30% is recommended when the outdoor temperature is below freezing.

5 Confirm that roof vents and louvers in the attic and basement crawl spaces are open.

6 Open the fireplace damper, when not in use, to allow an easier path for moisture to escape.

7 Install ceiling fans to keep air circulating within the home.

If troublesome condensation persists, see a local heating contractor about installing a direct outside air intake for the furnace.
